Constantly moving placements and schools so frequently, you learn to stay detached and not letting people in or pushing me away. Imagine having to do this for so long, it gets hard to actually make real bonds and be good. It destroyed my ability to let people in, I work on being a better me daily.

Fostering children is NOT for everyone. There's still soo much more you can do. We don't need to feel like charity cases, we don't just need houses, we, they, fosters, need families, homes, connections, love, opportunities, we need to be understood, be heard, encouraged, to know WE ARE NOT a statistic!

Being in care makes you feel less then. It can make or break you truly. Not all children in foster can handle it and sometimes the shitty stick they were handed beats them down, and for some, with the opportunity, can use it as a staff and stand tall and grow from it . My hope and passion is to help them dictate there own life's and how they wanna be better and more powerful and use there voices' and everyone else around should be support. Take small steps and advocate for these youth no matter who you are, you can make a difference.



I'm thankful for my time in Foster Care, yet it was rough, but I got through and I advocate for those who don't feel as though they can. Don't take what these foster's are going through for granted, there's so much under the surface level. I'm grateful to be able to now stand for what I experienced and it created the young lady I am today.



## Programs and Outcomes



### CARE...HOPE...MEND...

In 2019 Youth & Family Services, Inc. (YFS) celebrated **45** years of service! What started out as a emergency shelter has grown to include a variety of services that meet the needs of children, youth, and families in our community and around the state. Our goal is to provide long term services to improve the lives of those we serve through the emergency shelter, foster care services, independent living, street outreach, emergency services, counseling, and donor relations. These programs are provided in the following counties; Canadian, Blaine, Kingfisher. *Overall, YFS provided services for over 1,112 (children, youth and families), and approx. 54,726 service hours.* 



#### Caring Center (Shelter)

The Caring Center provides a safe environment for children and youth, ages 0-18. YFS provides a continuum of care program for each child or youth upon entry, many arrive confused and frightened. The YFS staff is trained and equipped to help each child to feel safe, sometimes for the first time. The Caring Center is open 24/7. *The Caring Center provided services for over 68 children and youth and provided over* 12,261 hours of service.

Foster Care started out of the emergency shelter to provide long term care to those coming through the Caring

Center. Through the past 7 years, this service has grown to provide wraparound services to those that choose to foster through foster parents training, respite care for foster families, and staff support for the everyday life as a family. As of 2019 YFS has had 82 adoptions and 100 reunifications with their biological family members. It is not uncommon for children in the foster care system to move from home to home. At YFS there is a 95% success rate, which includes no network disruptions for children until reunified with a family member or adopted. This is coupled with 100% of our foster families feeling supported and happy with the services they



receive. Foster Care provided services for approx. 116 children/youth and over 12,400 service hours. There were 9 adoptions, 9 family re-unifications and 9 new approved Foster Homes.

## Programs and Outcomes



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The YFS <u>Counseling Services</u> provides person-centered counseling for children/youth ages 3-21. Programs available include outpatient counseling, school based counseling and consultation, family, drug and alcohol education, Community At Risk Services (CARS), Parent-child Interaction Therapy (PCIT) and a First Time Offenders Program (FTOP).

Counseling served 595 children, youth and families and provided approx. 1,430 service hours.



**Emergency Services:** YFS takes emergencies seriously. All staff have been trained and follow a protocol in the event a call comes through or a person walks in the door with emergency needs. Counselors are on call 24/7, the Caring Shelter is open 24/7 and answers calls when the main office is not open. There are several programs that can offer help to those experiencing or facing homelessness.

**Donor Relations/Volunteers:** It takes a village! YFS cannot provide these services alone. Other like agencies in our communities help support our services. We are also thankful for the in-kind donors, individual donors, the civic groups and churches that provide so much of what is needed. Our Volunteers and Donors are awesome!

### CARE...HOPE...MEND...



Independent Living/Street Outreach program provides services for youth ages 16-21, that are at risk for homelessness, including runaways, gang members, young mothers, and those in need of emergency housing. While participating in the program they are taught daily life skills, how to find employment, give back through community service and setting goals for themselves. Independent Living/Street Outreach has served 265 youth and provided over 2,882 hours of service.
